
## **Audrain County Cemeteries**



## McIntosh Family Cemetery

Sec 24 T50N R9W. South from Mexico city limits on USHy 54 to CoRd #834. CoRd #834 is east bound, first road south of StRd D, after crossing Scattering Fork Branch. Proceed east on CoRd #834 about 1 3/4 miles to CoRd #815, south on CoRd #815 about 3/4 miles. Cemetery is on west side of CoRd #815 about 1/4 mile west of barn at end of private drive. No stones remain. Cemetery was on Ed Schulte property in 1990..

Mr. Schulte stated that he became aware of the existence of this cemetery when he discovered it is designated in the abstract of his farm. He said that a neighbor told him that the gravestones had been moved to a nearby cemetery but did not know which. Death notices published in newspapers provided the documentation for the two burials listed here but in all probability Mr. Calvert's wife and Mrs; McIntosh's husband are buried here. The ground was very hard and dry when the compiler visited McIntosh cemetery in the summer of 1990 so she could not probe for fallen stones.

The cemetery is good sized and there appears to have been a large number of burials here.

Mrs. Sarah McIntosh, wife of G.L. McIntosh, aged 78 years, died at the home of her grandson, George Throckmorton, south ot town, this morning at 9:30 o'clock, of general debility and old age. The funeral services will be held at the family burying ground tomorrow afternoon. Deceased leaves one son, G. Lloyd McIntosh. (see The Daily Intelligencer 14 Sep 1898 p4 c7)

Marshall C. Calvert... died at his home, six miles south of Mexico, Saturday Nov. 9th, 1901.

...He was interred at McIntosh burial ground...M.C. Calvert was born in Boone co., Ky.. Sept. 6, 1836...enlisted in the army and fought under Morgan...on July 14th, 1867, was married to Louisa J. McIntosh. Six children...Mrs. Sallie N. Throckmorton, George L. Calvert, Roy C. Calvert, Mrs. Lula M. Icenogle, Mrs Rachel Hodge and Henry C. Calvert. His wife preceded him to the grave 12 years ago.
